- **The Economy** → Supporting economic growth, lowering taxes and reducing government regulation.

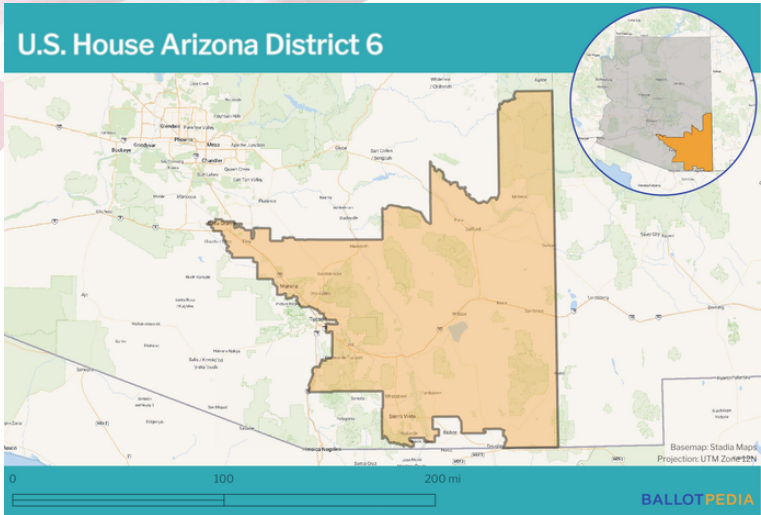
Bills and Voting Records:

Rep. Ciscomani has primarily supported legislation related to national security, health, immigration, government operations and politics, and public lands and natural resources. He has maintained a strongly conservative voting record, aligning with his party most of the time. He has a high voting participation rate, missing 28 votes while recording 410 votes in the current session.



HEAD START FACTS AND FIGURES

ARIZONA'S 6TH DISTRICT



Arizona's **6th congressional district** encompasses all of Greenlee County, most of Cochise County, and parts of Pima, Pinal, and Graham Counties. Most of its population lives in the suburbs of Tucson. It is mostly urban and does not have a strong conservative or democratic lean.

Demographics:

- 833,800 people
- 33,700 children under 5
- Median household income: \$80,300
- Families with income below the poverty level: 6%

Head Start Facts - 6TH District

- 27 programs in the district
- 1,128 slots
- \$21 million in funding (2024)
- Long-term economic impact of child care gaps on households, businesses, and tax revenue: \$307.7M

Statewide Head Start Figures:

- 14,777 funded seats
 - 3,525 American Indian/Alaska Native seats
- 1,664 teachers, family child care providers, and home visitors are employed
- 195 partnerships to serve children with disabilities
- 145 partnerships to support the transition to kindergarten
- 11,183 Head Start parents are employed, in school, or in job training
