- **Immigration** → Committed to supporting immigrants and diverse communities by opposing discriminatory immigration policies and celebrating the contributions of families

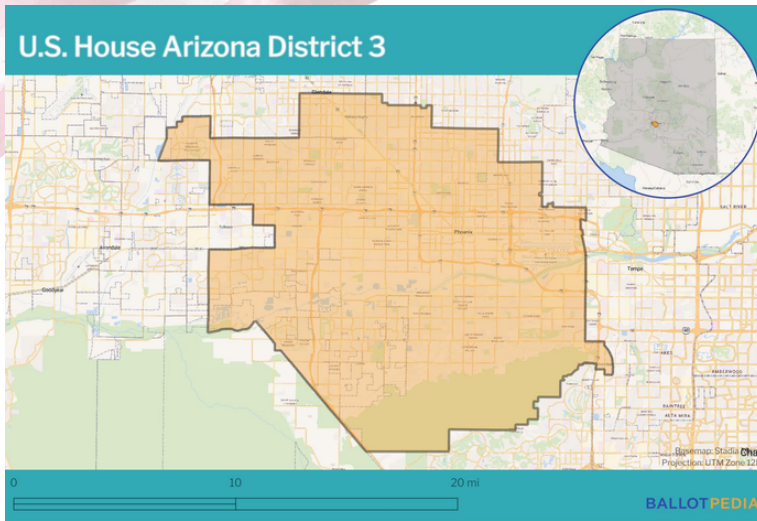
Bills and Voting Records:

Rep Ansari has supported bills around international affairs, immigration, health, and public lands and natural resources. She has maintained a high rate of voting with the Democratic party and a high voting record, missing 9 of 440 roll call votes.



HEAD START FACTS AND FIGURES

ARIZONA'S 3RD DISTRICT



Arizona's **3rd congressional district** includes most of southern, western and downtown Phoenix, as well as a southern portion of Glendale. It is mostly urban and strongly Democratic, voting significantly more Democratic than the national average.

Demographics:

- 834,800 people
- 54,000 children under 5
- Median household income: \$70,500
- Families with income below the poverty level: 14%

Head Start Facts - 3rd District

- 102 programs in the district
- 3,672 slots
- \$54.1 million in funding (2024)
- Long-term economic impact of child care gaps on households, businesses, and tax revenue: \$573.8M

Statewide Head Start Figures:

- 14,777 funded seats
 - 3,525 American Indian/Alaska Native seats
- 1,664 teachers, family child care providers, and home visitors are employed
- 195 partnerships to serve children with disabilities
- 145 partnerships to support the transition to kindergarten
- 11,183 Head Start parents are employed, in school, or in job training
