- **Small government** → he'd like to reduce what he sees as overreach by federal agencies and bureaucrats.
- **Border security and immigration enforcement** → he'd like to see tighter border security and stronger enforcement of immigration laws and measures to secure the southern border.
- **Education** → he doesn't believe that the federal government has a role to play in the education system and would rather see states and communities control it.
- **Healthcare** → he opposes the Affordable Care Act and recently introduced a legislative package that he says would lower premiums and restore competition (see press release).

ARIZONA'S 5TH DISTRICT

Arizona's **5th congressional district** contains Gilbert, Queen Creek, eastern Mesa, and southern and eastern Chandler. It is within eastern Maricopa County and northern Pinal County, and includes most of the East Valley.

Demographics:

- 902,000 people
- 53,600 children under 5
- Median household income: \$112,100
- Families with income below the poverty level: 4.8%

HEAD START FACTS – 5TH DISTRICT:

- 13 programs in the district
- 71 preschool classroom teachers and assistant teachers working
- 580 families served
- 654 cumulative children enrolled
- 87% of families have received at least one service (housing assistance, mental health services, ESL training, assistance in enrolling into an education or job training program, etc)
- 31 families experiencing homelessness served
- \$6.4 million in funding (2024)
